For two years, the BSHS administration had wanted to bring a CNA class to campus for students interested in health care careers. With a $\$ 19,230$ grant from the county, that dream became possible.
That was good news for the seven students who were planning to take the course at the KCKCC Tech Center.
"I had to rearrange my schedule, but it was nice because it saved me the trip of driving out there every day," said senior Alyissa Mendoza.
With the class being offered at school, 20 students were ultimately able to participate, according to vice principal Jared Jackson.
Students in the course met during first and second hour with instructor Debbie Horton both semesters.
"I liked the class a lot," said senior Brittney Clark. "I liked that we were like a close-knit family. Debbie gave us a lot of helpful examples for real-world patient care."
The group did their clinical rotations on block days at the Bonner Springs Nursing and Rehabilitation Center.

By the end of the first semester, the students were prepared to take their boards, and all of the students successfully passed that exam.

According to instructor Jan Madlock, students start with a block of clay and have to mold and place the organs in the correct positions on the mannequin.
"We tie in whatever system we're on and build that system onto the mannequin," Madlock said. "They have greatly enhanced our classes and the students' understanding of anatomy."

The goal of the Unified Sports initiative is to give athletes, with and without intellectual disabilities, the chance to compete on the same level. Now in its third year, the USD 204 program continues to grow and prosper.
All of the teams enjoyed an exceptional year. The basketball teams placed first in their last tournament of the season at Harmon, and the soccer teams all placed at the home tournament on May 7.
Following the lead of Special Olympics, the sponsoring organization of Unified Sports, a third sport was added to the mix: bocce ball.
"I was really excited to include bocce ball because it provided options for kids who are not able to be as active to get involved," said sponsor Denise Chowning. "We were able to have two teams at the high school and two teams at the middle school, therefore adding four additional athletes who were unable to participate in soccer and basketball."
The addition of more athletes and a new sport has meant the need for new equipment and uniforms.
Chowning said the program received a huge boost with a $\$ 32,000$ not-for-profit donation from athlete Dylan Clark's church, the Grandview Christian Church.
Chowning said this donation and money raised from the Polar Plunge was used to purchase "real" sports uniforms and equipment.
"Unified Sports has made a huge impact on our students with intellectual disabilities with sport specific improvement and the opportunity to feel like they are part of a Braves' team," Chowning said.
