




And almost 800 students itching to get into the building to see that new look.





While the cars were struggling to get through the crowd, Terrell was accidently hit by one of the vehicles.


"I got bumped in the leg by shortstop Buddy Biancalana's car. It left a big bruise," Terrell said.





The biggest part of the makeover involved float construction. Instead of constructing floats on trailers at the bus barn, students created entries on chicken-wire frames in the gym.



DeLeon said that the students, staff and community members all had a positive reaction to these changes.


Another big part of the celebration was the increased participation in spirit days.

I think that this year was the best Homecoming turnout out of my high school experience.





For more than three decades, the KAY-sponsored Powder Puff game has been a proud tradition, enjoyed by students and the community. It is the classic reversal of roles, where the females sport football jerseys and the males pump up the crowd as cheerleaders.

However, interest in the event is declining. According to sponsor Jennifer Stricherz, there has been a lack of attendance for two consecutive years and the fate of the game is not certain for the future.

"It's not supported enough by the student body and community to be a fundraiser," Stricherz said.

The service club has no budget and must raise its own funds for their projects.

Powder Puff has traditionally been their biggest fundraiser. However, tickets and concession sales this year were below \$400 with an overall profit of about \$200. In the past, profits were approximately \$800.

"We have been making more money selling doughnuts before school than putting on Powder Puff," Stricherz said.

The club, of course, is about more than just the game. In addition to adopting families during the holidays, they volunteer at the Leavenworth VFW where they clean and maintain the property a couple of times a year.

One of those new performers was senior Heidi Rodgers in the lead role of Annie.





"Harvey is a strongly written, easy-to-understand show that I've always liked," Hotchkiss said. "I was very excited to get the opportunity to direct it."




Hotchkiss also taught Forensics, which existed solely as an extra-curricular activity last year, and Drama and Stagecraft.




What was the most exciting part of debate? Being a first-year debate team and coming home with three medals.







New replicas of human skeletons topped the desks of Anatomy students this year. The "Anatomy in Clay" mannequins were purchased with a \$6,000 Perkins health science grant aimed to teach students the placement and shape of human organ systems.

According to instructor Jan Madlock, students start with a block of clay and have to mold and place the organs in the correct positions on the mannequin.

"We tie in whatever system we're on and build that system onto the mannequin," Madlock said. "They have greatly enhanced our classes and the students' understanding of anatomy."





Following the lead of Special Olympics, the sponsoring organization of Unified Sports, a third sport was added to the mix: bocce ball.


"I was really excited to include bocce ball because it provided options for kids who are not able to be as active to get involved," said sponsor Denise Chowning. "We were able to have two teams at the high school and two teams at the middle school, therefore adding four additional athletes who were unable to participate in soccer and basketball."

The addition of more athletes and a new sport has meant the need for new equipment and uniforms.

Chowning said the program received a huge boost with a \$32,000 not-for-profit donation from athlete Dylan Clark's church, the Grandview Christian Church.

Chowning said this donation and money raised from the Polar Plunge was used to purchase "real" sports uniforms and equipment.

"Unified Sports has made a huge impact on our students with intellectual disabilities with sport specific improvement and the opportunity to feel like they are part of a Braves' team," Chowning said.



At the beginning of the season, coach Dan Streit had four goals: win the Eudora and Baldwin tournaments, compete for the league title and win sub-state.

After losing just two games in the regular season, the Braves took care of BVSW in the first round of sub-state, setting up a tough match against St. James on their home court for the championship. The Braves had a slow first half, putting themselves in a nine-point hole, but that wasn't going to stop them.

"All I told them to do was to start playing like men," Streit said. "They were playing like little boys out there. We went back out there and they did what they were told."

The most exciting game of the year ended with a 37-34 win, sending this team to state tournament for the first time in 19 years.

In the opening round, the Braves were the No. 2 seed up against the No. 7 seed, Kapaun Mt. Carmel. The Braves fought hard but fell short in a 55-51 loss. However, there was nothing to hang their heads about as the seniors led this team to an astounding 20-3 record.

"The seniors' leadership, their work ethic and push for wanting to get to state got us to where we wanted to go," Streit said.











Although their season did not turn out as they hoped, the Braves remained positive, and the team did lots of bonding and grew closer as friends






